Categories of contributions	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Political Action/Advocacy <ol style="list-style-type: none"> a. Letter writing campaigns b. Starting/advancing a petition c. Lobbying d. Organizing a political action event

	<p>2. Participation</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> a. Rally/march/vigil b. In event/initiative i.e. tie purple ribbons on car antenna or wear a T-shirt and get signatures c. Collect/distribute items i.e. shoes, food, clothing <p>3. Education/Information</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> a. Social media (Facebook/Twitter etc.) b. Creating and/or distributing educational material via video/poster/canon etc. <p>4. Research</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> a. Academic literature search/Annotated bibliography b. Using relevant research as content for social media campaigns
